STATEMENT OF BASIS AND PURPOSE

Summary of the basis and purpose for new rule or rule change.

The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) is a federal food assistance program actively administered in Colorado. SNAP provides food assistance benefits as part of a federal nutrition program to help low-income households purchase food. The United States Department of Agriculture, Food and Nutrition Service annually evaluates Federal income poverty guidelines and cost of living increases to determine appropriate adjustments to income eligibility standards, benefit allotments, and deductions for the upcoming Federal Fiscal Year (FFY). The modified figures are typically made available to states during the month of August immediately prior to the next fiscal year. The COLA changes in this regulation package are required to become effective 10/01/2023.

Justification for emergency:

Each year, FNS disseminates the new standards to states for use in the upcoming federal fiscal year. The COLA adjustments are mandated to be implemented at the beginning of FFY24 (October 1, 2023). It is imperative to incorporate these rules to comply with federal SNAP regulations that must be effective October 1, 2023. Noncompliance with federal SNAP regulations as of October 1, 2023, conflicts with public interest.

- A. THE FOLLOWING INDIVUDALS ARE NOT CONSIDERED ABAWDS AND ARE THEREFORE NOT SUBJECT TO THE ABAWD WORK REQUIREMENT:
 - 1. AGED SEVENTEEN (17) OR YOUNGER.

- 2. AGED FIFTY-THREE (53) OR OLDER.
- 3. DETERMINED TO BE MEDICALLY CERTIFIED AS PHYSICALLY OR MENTALLY UNFIT FOR EMPLOYMENT. AN INDIVIDUAL IS MEDICALLY CERTIFIED AS PHYSICALLY OR MENTALLY UNFIT FOR EMPLOYMENT IF THEY:
 - A. ARE RECEIVING TEMPORARY OR PERMANENT DISABILITY BENEFITS ISSUED BY GOVERNMENTAL OR PRIVATE SOURCES:
 - B. ARE OBVIOUSLY MENTALLY OR PHYSICALLY UNFIT FOR EMPLOYMENT AS DETERMINED BY THE LOCAL OFFICE; OR
 - C. PROVIDE A STATEMENT FROM A PHYSICIAN, PHYSICIAN'S ASSISTANT, NURSE, NURSE PRACTITIONER, DESIGNATED REPRESENTATIVE OF THE PHYSICIAN'S OFFICE, A LICENSED OR CERTIFIED PSYCHOLOGIST, A SOCIAL WORKER, OR ANY OTHER QUALIFIED HEALTH PROFESSIONAL AS DEFINED IN 12-200-101 THROUGH 12-315-126, C.R.S., THAT THE CLIENT IS PHYSICALLY OR MENTALLY UNFIT FOR EMPLOYMENT.
- 4. RESIDING IN THE SAME PHYSICAL HOUSEHOLD WITH AN INDIVIDUAL WHO IS UNDER THE AGE OF EIGHTEEN (18). THE MINOR INDIVIDUAL DOES NOT HAVE TO BE INCLUDED IN THE SAME SNAP HOUSEHOLD FOR THIS EXCLUSION TO APPLY.
- AB. To fulfill the ABAWD work requirement, the ABAWD must be:

Failure to meet the ABAWD work requirement will result in the ABAWD losing eligibility as a result of IF THEY ACCRUE the accruing three countable months within a thirty-six (36) calendar month period.

4.311.1 ABAWD Exemptions

ANY INDIVIDUAL WHO MEETS THE DEFINITION OF AN ABAWD CAN BE EXEMPT FROM THE ABAWD WORK REQUIREMENT BY MEETING ONE OF THE FOLLOW EXEMPTIONS: While ABAWDs can be exempt under general work requirement exemptions, these individuals could also meet one of the following ABAWD exemptions:

- BD. Pregnancy;
- C. A PERSON EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS, AS DEFINED IN SECTION 4.000.1;
- D. VETERANS;
- E. AGED TWENTY-FOUR (24) YEARS AND YOUNGER AND IN FOSTER CARE ON THEIR EIGHTEENTH (18TH) BIRTHDAY;
- FE. Exempt under a waiver approved by the USDA, FNS; OR
- GF. Exempt using Colorado defined state exemptions as identified in the current SNAP Employment and Training State Plan.
