**Additional Motion & Exhibits of Interested Third Party Concerning the  
Abandonment proceedings of the town of Bonanza City.**

**A. Introduction**

This is a supplemental request and brief for denial of request for abandonment of Bonanza City. I am requesting that all information from initial request be incorporated herein.

C,R.S. 31-3-201(1) provides the following:

**“When any town has failed, for a period of five years or longer immediately prior to the filing of the application under this section, to hold any regular or special election or to elect officers and to maintain any town government, such town may be determined to be abandoned as follows:” (Exhibit A.)**

The following criteria has to met for the Town of Bonanza City to be declared abandoned by the Secretary of State for Colorado (SOS) There must be evidence presented that there has not been (1)a regular election or (2)a special election (3) or elected officers for a period of five years or longer immediately prior to the filing of the application for abandonment and (4)failure to maintain any town government for a period of five years or longer prior to the filing of the application for abandonment.

## **B.TIME PERIOD**

The Application for abandonment was filed with the SOS office by Mr. Ben Gibbons, Saguache County Attorney. In his letter requesting a determination of abandonment, Gibbons noted that (1) for a period of at least five years (since 2007) Bonanza had failed to function as a municipality with a functioning governmental body; (2) hold regular elections (since 2007) and publish the results of such election in the county newspaper of record; (3) provide mill levy certification to Saguache County; (4) file an audit or request for exemption with the State Auditor. **(Exhibit B)** A Notice of application for the Determination of Abandonment was filed on November 19, 2013 by the SOS. **(Exhibit C)**. The notice provided that the "application alleges as its grounds that the town failed, for a period of longer than five years immediately before the filing of the application, to hold any regular or special election, elect officers, or maintain any of the functions of town government."

The notice of application provides the time limit to be "for a period of longer than five years immediately before the filing of the application".

This language gives the SOS the authority to determine what is met by the language "for a period of longer than five years".

## **C.GENERAL ELECTIONS**

A general election was held on April 4, 2006. There were 22 voters, who cast their ballots in the election. The elected Mayor was Joan Selvage. Robert Selvage, Beth Pool and Richard Williams were elected to the four member town board. "While the vote was being conducted, full time resident Gail Holbrook challenged all four candidates, maintaining that state law requires they reside in the town for 12 months prior to the election" **(Exhibit D Article from Pueblo Chieftain published Thursday April 06, 2006 for election Tuesday April 04, 2006)**

C.R.S. 31-10-1401 provides that when there is a controversy in an election the district court where the election is held shall with a verified petition summarily hear and dispose of such issues. **(Exhibit E)** Gail Holbrook filed a verified petition in the District Court of Saguache County, Colorado. The court summarily heard

the matter and dismissed the petition. With this dismissal, the elected town officials at the general election April 4, 2006 were Joan Salvage, Robert Salvage, Beth Pool and Richard Williams. The court declared the winners of the election to be Joan Salvage, **(Exhibit F, Verified Petition and Order of District Court of Saguache County, Colorado involving the 2006 election of general officers of Bonanza Colorado as shown in the court records of the District Court of Saguache County, Colorado).**

The general election was within a time period of 7 years, 7 months from the date of the filing of the request. for abandonment. I submit that the extra time period of 7 years, 7 months would meet the time dead line of five years or longer as required by statute.

I request that the SOS find that for the purposes of this hearing that the language "five years or longer" be defined as 8 years.

I further request that the SOS find that there was a regular election of the town of Bonanza City held within 7 years and 7 months from the filing of the request for abandonment.

#### **D.A special election for the un incorporation of the town of Bonanza**

C.R.S. 31-3-101 provides that proceedings to discontinue the incorporation of any town may be commenced by the filing of a petition signed by 25 percent of the registered voters with the district court of the county where the town is located. A election shall be voted on by the registered electors of the town at its next regular election. **(Exhibit G)**

In the year 2008, Harold Eckley , an elected Bonanza City town official met with the Saguache County Commissioners to inform them that a petition to unincorporated the town of Bonanza was being circulated and that the matter would be decided by voters in November, 2008 at the next general election. **(Exhibit H.)**

In an article of the Pueblo Chieftain published a few days before the General Election on November 4, 2008, two elected officials cited the request for disincorporation to be lack of bodies and passion to participate. **(Exhibit I )**

The voting on disincorporation was held on November 4, 2008 as a special election for the town of Bonanza City and a part of the general election Saguache County and the state of Colorado. . The residents of the town voted 11-10 to unincorporate the town. The margin however was not enough for the ballot issue to pass since the statute requires a 2/3 majority. **(Exhibit J) (Exhibit K District Court Records for Saguache County, Colorado Petition for Disincorporation).**

I request that SOS find that a special election was held for the town of Bonanza City in the general election on November 4, 2008.

#### **E.MAINTAIN ANY TOWN GOVERNMENT.**

The elected town officials for the time period from January 2007 to March 4. 2011 performed different administrative functions for the town of Bonanza. These are some of the examples of the different administrative functions.

For the year 2007, the administrative officers spent \$325.00 for the enactment of an ordinance for a conservation easement. The source of the funds were the CTF funds. **(Exhibit L)**

C.R. S 29-1-113(1) . provided that no later than thirty days following the beginning of the fiscal year, the governing body of the town of Bonanza City had to file a certified copy of a budget with the Colorado Department of Local Affairs. On January 22, 2009, the annual budget for Bonanza City was filed with the Colorado Department of Local Affairs. **(Exhibit M. )**

Town of Bonanza was receiving HUTF funds which they were paying to Saguache County for maintenance of the streets. On 12/31/2008 a check was made payable to Saguache County Treasurer for the sum of \$312.71 for HUTF payments and on 1/21/09 a check made payable to Saguache County Treasurer for the sum Saguache County Treasurer for the sum of \$282.60 for HUTF payments **(Exhibit O)**

## E.SUMMARY

I move for an order by the SOS dismissing the petition of the Saguache County Attorney for the Abandonment of Bonanza City, Colorado.

SAGUACHE – Saguache County Commissioners recently directed county attorney Ben Gibbons to petition the Secretary of State's Office (SOS) to abandon the town of Bonanza, located north of Saguache and west of Villa Grove.

The notice for abandonment appeared in a recent issue of the Center Post-Dispatch. A determination hearing for the abandonment of the town has been set for Jan. 7, 11 a.m. at the

## Outsiders hijacked vote, Bonanza resident claims

**BONANZA** - The pot is boiling in one of Colorado's smallest towns.

The town has 22 voters, all of whom cast their ballots in Tuesday's municipal election.

Incumbent Mayor Joan Selvage ran unopposed; her husband, Robert, along with Beth Pool and Richard Williams, were elected to the four-member town board.

Trouble is, they all live in Pueblo much of the year.

While the vote was being conducted, full-time resident Gail Holbrook challenged all four candidates, maintaining that state law requires they reside in the town for 12 months prior to the election.

Mayor Selvage says all the election winners are legal residents of Bonanza. She maintains that the statute is clear: to be a legal resident, one must be 18 years old, declare the town their legal residence and not try to vote anywhere else.

Holbrook counters that candidates must respect the 12-month physical residency requirement.

The Selvages, Pool and Williams are not registered to vote in Pueblo County, according to records kept by the county clerk.

The sniping is getting worse.

"Gail and her husband, Ed (Carpenter), have their home in the mill site and not in the town limits, but nobody makes a big deal of it," Mrs. Selvage said.

Not so, says Holbrook. "It's really nobody's business but our home is in the town. There is a dispute, but we do live in the town. We own a piece of property well within town since 1881."

The mayor says that Holbrook's challenge is disruptive and illegal.

"It was an illegal challenge. It was not turned in properly. The challenge should have been made within three days of posting the election. It was done yesterday (Tuesday). The election judges take her oath. The person turning in the challenge should be given an oath and she did not swear to the challenge," Mrs. Selvage said.

The mayor is convinced that everything was in order for the election, but she is seeking legal advice and has called off Saturday's swearing-in ceremony.

"I am tired of having to deal with it. I don't want to go through this every two years. I want a legal ruling," Mrs. Selvage said.

Mrs. Selvage said Town Clerk Terry Furney, a resident of Pueblo, is checking into the matter. She said Furney is unpaid and does not have to be a resident of the town to be its clerk.

No one on the board is paid.

Bonanza's budget is \$10,000, which is used to maintain the town, keep the ordinances current, maintain the street lights and do "nominal things," Mrs. Selvage said.

State Highway Users Trust Fund dollars that are used to maintain the town's roads go to Saguache County, Mrs. Selvage said.

"We have people interested in keeping Bonanza safe for full-time residents and those interested in going there," she said.

The town board used to be composed of six members plus the mayor but was reduced to four board members plus the mayor because it was difficult to get members, especially back in the days when there were often only a handful of residents in this tiny mountain town where the silver mines have long ago played out.

### 31-10-1401. Controversies

(1) When any controversy arises between any official charged with any duty or function under this article and any candidate or other person, the district court, upon the filing of a verified petition by any such official or person setting forth in concise form the nature of the controversy and the relief sought, shall issue an order commanding the respondent in such petition to appear before the court and answer under oath to such petition. It is the duty of the court to summarily hear and dispose of any such issues, with a view to obtaining a substantial compliance with the provisions of this article by the parties to such controversy, and to make and enter orders and judgments and to follow the procedures of such court to enforce all such orders and judgments.

(2) Such proceedings may be reviewed and finally adjudicated by the supreme court of this state if application to such court is made within five days after the termination thereof by the court in which the petition was filed and if the supreme court is willing to assume jurisdiction of the case.

C.R.S. 31-3-101 (2014)

31-3-101. Petition to the district court

Proceedings to discontinue the incorporation of any city or town may be commenced by the filing of a petition to discontinue such incorporation, signed by twenty-five percent of the registered electors of the city or town, with the district court of the county wherein such city or town, or any part thereof, is situate. Upon satisfying itself that the petition meets the requirements of this section, the court shall cause a notice to be published once each week for at least four weeks, which notice shall state that the question of discontinuing the incorporation of such city or town shall be submitted to a vote of the registered electors thereof at its next regular election.

Tiny town wants to undo incorporation

**SAGUACHE** — The tiny community of Bonanza doesn't want to be a town anymore.

Residents of the town, population 17, in the mountains in the San Luis Valley's northern end told Saguache County Commissioners this week they want to unincorporate.

The town has been around since the mining days late in the 19th century. But Bonanza Mayor Harold Eckley has told commissioners that petitions to unincorporate the town are being circulated.

Because some of the residents still want the "town" label, the matter likely will be decided by voters in November.

Eckley said that for the few hundred dollars in taxes the town receives each year, it isn't worth the trouble to stay incorporated.

What kind of trouble? For example, in recent years it hasn't been unusual for the town to cancel a municipal election due to a lack of candidates.

Also, in the winter, the town loses about half its residents.

## Bonanza votes on its very existence

**BONANZA \_ Will Bonanza officially die on Tuesday? Or will the handful of residents in what might be Colorado's tiniest town preserve the memory of a mining boomtown where thousands once lived?**

Bonanza incorporated in 1881 during its heyday. But the mines are no more, and today residents number in the dozens \_ at best. And many of those residents leave during the winter to live where it's warmer.

So in Tuesday's mail-in ballot election, voters will decide whether to "disincorporate."

The town government has found it difficult to function due to the small population of year-round residents, Town Treasurer Dan Beal explained Thursday.

The precise number of official residents in Bonanza differs, but virtually everyone agrees it is one of Colorado's smallest incorporated towns. Please see Longtime resident Gail Holbrook said the town has only seven residents in the winter, perhaps as many as 12 full-time residents in the summer, and only a few souls less than 30 live here part-time.

Ms. Holbrook, who was on the town board and involved with the town government for about 30 years, said the county clerk has 29 people registered to vote in Bonanza.

Most of those residents actually live elsewhere much of the year, including Mayor Harold Eckley, who headed for warmer weather in Arizona last month, Ms. Holbrook said.

Ms. Holbrook has challenged several of those people's right to vote here, she said, adding she does not know what effect her challenges will have on Tuesday's election.

It's the lack of bodies and passion to participate in town government that the two town officials cited as the request for the disincorporation request.

Beal, who has been on the town board about three years, and town board member Donna Horkans, who has lived here for five years and has been a board member "a couple of years," said the town shouldn't be incorporated.

"I'm all for it (disincorporation). There are not enough people to run a town. That's the main reason," said Ms. Horkans, who is one of the few year-round residents.

But Ms. Holbrook said if the town is disincorporated, residents will lose control of their future. She pointed to the sale of large properties "for high prices" near Bonanza, adding that five cabins have been built above Bonanza already this year.

Building "will have some effect on the town eventually," she said, insisting that the town will have to be incorporated if it is to have any control over growth.

She said Saguache County's concerns center on Crestone and La Garita, where growth is "almost out of control. To some, Bonanza is a blip on the map and this whole disincorporation issue is a laughing matter.

"It's not a laughing matter to town residents."

Disincorporation will disqualify the area for state grants, she noted, adding that the community is "up for a grant from the state historical society for people who own historic cabins to renovate them."

Ms. Holbrook, who from some accounts single-handedly ran the town during her years as town clerk, said: "It does not take anything to run a little itty bitty town with one crossroad and a few cabins. We always found that funding was sufficient \_ more than sufficient."

The town receives money from Saguache County, the Highway Users' Trust Fund and Great Outdoors Colorado and has about \$10,000 in its coffers, Beal said.

Ms. Holbrook said those disincorporate proponents don't want year-round, full-time residents to run the town.

"It takes ingenuity, inventiveness and love," she said, noting that prior town boards have managed, even getting statewide attention with their skull and crossbones signs on Kerber Creek warning people not to drink the water.

BONANZA - Residents voted 11-10 Tuesday to end this tiny community's 118-year existence as a town, but that margin wasn't enough for the ballot issue to pass.

The disincorporation measure required a two-thirds majority to be effective.

Some town officials, maintaining that it was hard to run a town government with so few year-round residents, had asked the electorate to repeal the town's incorporated status.

The precise number of official residents in Bonanza differs, but virtually everyone agrees it is one of Colorado's smallest incorporated towns.

It wasn't always so. Thousands lived in Bonanza during its boomtown days in the 1800s.

Longtime resident Gail Holbrook said the town has only seven residents in the winter, perhaps as many as 12 full-time residents in the summer and just a few souls less than 30 part-timers. However, Ms. Holbrook, who no longer is on the town board, said the lack of residents was no reason to disincorporate.

"It takes ingenuity, inventiveness and love," she said of the commitment to run the town.

Following the election, she said she was "so pleased because actually I thought it would be much closer. I'm very happy for the town. I think it can grow and prosper."

Most of those residents actually live elsewhere much of the year, including Mayor Harold Eckly, who headed for warmer climes in Arizona in September. Ms. Holbrook said.

Ms. Holbrook said if the town were not incorporated, residents would lose control of their future.
